

HELENA, Mont. — Several governors are fuming over a Bush administration suggestion that the active military take a greater role in disaster response, calling it an attempt to usurp state authority over National Guard units.

Governors in Washington, Mississippi, Michigan, Arkansas, West Virginia, Delaware and Alabama are among those who have panned the idea, questioning whether it would even be constitutional.

Montana Gov. Brian Schweitzer, among the harshest critics, said the issue promises to be a major topic at the Western Governors Association meeting in Phoenix next week.

"I'm going to stand up among a bunch of elected governors and say, 'Are we going to allow the military without a shot being fired to effectively do an end-run coup on civilian government? Are we going to allow that?" Schweitzer said. "We're going to have a little civics lesson for some leaders who are apparently out of touch in the military."

President Bush first suggested in September that the active military ought to have a greater role in responding to disasters. He said the military's training, command structure and resources put it in a better position to lead recovery efforts. Adm. Timothy J. Keating, commander at U.S. Northern Command, has endorsed the idea as well.

"It's a bad idea for the military to make that decision and usurp the authority that under the U.S. Constitution stays with the governor and local authorities," Arkansas Gov. Mike Huckabee, a Republican, told The Associated Press last month.

Schweitzer said he became even more irate after seeing a copy of an e-mail circulating among National Guard commanders this week that contends active duty military leaders are suggesting taking federal control even further.

The e-mail, written by Washington National Guard Maj. Gen. Timothy Lowenberg, contends that Keating has been telling military officers that National Guard officers are not capable of handling "command and control."

Lowenberg also wrote that active duty military leaders under Keating have talked about the idea of certifying the competence of governors to handle domestic emergencies.

"Some might liken this to a policy of domestic regime change," Lowenberg wrote.

Northwest Illinois National Guardsman Killed

A 28-year-old Galesburg man has been killed while on active duty in Iraq.

Military officials say Staff Sergeant Kyle Wherly was killed yesterday in Ashraf -- north of Baghdad -- when a roadside bomb detonated near his vehicle.

Wherly was a 1996 graduate of Galesburg High School.

The Illinois National Guard says he enlisted in 1995. He was assigned to Bravo Battery of the Second Battalion, 123rd Field Artillery based in Macomb.

Wherly is the 14th Illinois National Guard soldier killed since the war began.

There's no word yet on funeral arrangements.

Galesburg is about 200 miles north of St. Louis.

Resistance Attack In Force Overruns Fortified Position In Buhriz After Fools In U.S.

Command Said "Insurgents Largely Driven Out"

BUHRIZ, Iraq

Guerrilla fighters in Iraq mounted a massed dawn assault on a fortified police checkpoint north of Baghdad on Friday, killing six officers and wounding 10, police officials said.

Surprised by a mortar barrage as many Iraqis observed the start of the main annual holiday of Eid al-Fitr, the policemen were then assailed from all sides by insurgents with automatic weapons and rocket-propelled grenades.

"We did not know where the fire was coming from," said one officer who survived the 15-minute battle in the town of Buhriz, near Baquba, 65 km (40 miles) north of Baghdad.

"We returned fire, but we did not know at whom or what."

One policeman at the scene put the death toll as high as nine, with 12 officers wounded.

The attack, some weeks after U.S. officers said insurgents had largely been driven out of Buhriz, is the latest such assault on police bases.

U.S. commanders say these reveal fair levels of military training among rebel forces, some of whose leaders appear to be drawn from Saddam Hussein's old army.

It was not immediately known if any militants were hurt. [Translation: any occupation cops left alive ran away.]

"All The Men Are Dying, Including 'Mi Victor'"

PAJARO — Rita Silva looked down at the photo album containing the pictures of Victor Gonzalez, her grandson, who was killed in Iraq last fall. She murmured in Spanish that he was "an American hero who died for his country."

It wasn't the first time she summarized his life with those words, she said. And it won't be the last.

But in the same breath, she said Victor's death, at 19, by a roadside bomb on Oct. 13, 2004, in some distant country, never should have been allowed to happen.

The United States never should have gone into Iraq, she said matter-of-factly.

"What for? The war isn't right. War, in general, isn't right," she said. "It's getting to the point where the women are going to have to fight over there because all the men are dying, including 'Mi Victor.' "

It's no surprise then that the 73-year-old grandmother cringed when she heard via Spanish language news earlier this week that 2,000 soldiers have been killed in Iraq since the war started.

Every Friday night, Gael Murphy and Kristinn Taylor meet in Northwest Washington, separated by a bustling four-lane road -- and a whole lot more.

Since spring, the two have stood firmly on opposite sides of Georgia Avenue NW in front of Walter Reed Army Medical Center, Murphy leading a coalition of war protesters, Taylor marshaling supporters of the Iraq war.

Both sides say they are there to support the troops. Beyond that, there's little common ground.

"They start yelling, 'Murderer!' 'Traitor!' They call me by name," said Murphy, a cofounder of the women's antiwar group Code Pink. "It's aimed at disrupting our vigil."

To Taylor, a spokesman for the local chapter of FreeRepublic.com, a politically conservative Web site, disruption is an honorable goal.

"It's galling for us to see them across the street," he said. "They've endorsed the terrorists."

The Friday night gatherings near the District's northern tip, about six miles north of the White House, have become one of the most visible reminders in Washington of a war that has claimed the lives of more than 2,000 U.S. troops. That they are being staged outside a military hospital that treats the war's wounded makes the standoffs all the more pointed -- and controversial.

The war supporters, many of them known as "Freepers" because of their devotion to FreeRepublic.com, insist it is unpatriotic and demoralizing to protest the war in clear view of wounded soldiers. They started congregating along Georgia Avenue on Fridays after learning that the protesters were out there delivering a "despicable" message.

"We believe this is an obscene blood dance to exploit the war wounded for their twisted propaganda purposes," said Bill Floyd, 51, of Alexandria, a Freeper and Friday night regular. "It's indecent. Leave the wounded alone."

The antiwar forces say they chose Walter Reed as a backdrop when they started gathering in March to remind the public of the wounded troops and to point out inadequacies in their medical benefits.

"The administration sent these soldiers to war. Now that they're back and injured, they don't want to see them or hear about them," said Bruce Wolf, 58, of Takoma Park. "I don't want anyone to forget these guys are here."

Some Friday nights, up to three dozen people gather on each side of the street, although the groups can dwindle to about a dozen some weeks. Most are from the Washington area, but protesters -- and those who protest the protesters -- have come from as far away as California and Texas.

Motorists whiz by, many of them heading home from work for the weekend. Some honk or give a thumbs-up, although it's often hard to tell which side the gesture is meant for.

In signs and songs that often hearken back to the Vietnam War, the peace activists urge, "Bring the troops home!" and join in on "We Shall Overcome."

On the other side of the street, the entreaty is to "stay the course" and "let our troops finish their mission." Also famous from long ago are some of their taunts: "commie" and "pinko."

Murphy, 51, a full-time activist and former Peace Corps volunteer and public health adviser in Africa and the Caribbean, said she has tried to find common ground and create a dialogue.

Early on, she crossed the street more than once and suggested to her Friday night acquaintances that both sides had deeply held beliefs and were willing to stand up for them. It didn't work.

The war supporters, she said, responded: "We're alike? No way. Code Pink is evil. You're nothing like us."

Taylor, 43, also a full-time activist, scoffed at the notion of any solidarity.

"She has pulled that common-ground shtick on us before, and we reject it," he said.

Taylor calls Murphy and Code Pink -- "Code Pinko" to the Freepers -- traitors, saying members of the group were guests of Saddam Hussein when they went to Baghdad on a peace mission before the war. Murphy rejects that claim, saying she and others paid their own way on the fact-finding mission, which also sought to let Iraqis know that not all Americans supported war.

Murphy and Taylor both say wounded soldiers at Walter Reed have thanked them for what they're doing.

But one recent Friday night, Staff Sgt. Jeff Schaefer, 40, of New Smyrna Beach, Fla., was less than pleased to see the war protesters.

Schaefer, wounded by shrapnel from a mortar attack in Iraq, walked tentatively with the help of a cane outside the hospital gates. A large gash scarred his forehead.

"They're not doing any good," he said. "George Bush isn't driving down the street. Neither is Cheney. (The protesters) are just pissing off the soldiers."

The same night, John Bruhns, a former infantry soldier who fought in Iraq from 2003 to 2004, bristled at taunts leveled by war supporters.

"I'm very anti-Iraq war," he said. "I'm a proud American. I'm a patriot."

"The mob scene on the other side is trying to say we're anti-troops," Bruhns, 28, said last week. The war protesters "support the troops; they just don't support the war. That isn't impossible, but it's something the opposition refuses to recognize."

More often than not, Murphy said, soldiers at Walter Reed, their relatives and hospital personnel have said, "'Thanks for being here.' That's why we come back here. That's why we can take the risk of offending. They want the war to end, and they want the wounded to be taken care of."

Most of the standoffs are peaceful, although occasional shoves have been exchanged when supporters of the war have crossed the street and gotten in protesters' faces while taking photos of them, Murphy said.

Some of the pictures end up on FreeRepublic.com, complete with mocking captions and commentary and venomous remarks from bloggers on the site.

In September, a motorist stopped in front of the war supporters and threw an apple into the crowd before speeding off. No one was injured, but police were summoned.

Recently, about a dozen veterans on motorcycles started revving their engines in front of the war protesters, trying to chase them off. The activists stood their ground.

Taylor offers no apology for the war supporters' take-no-prisoners approach.

"We treat them with a contempt that they've earned," he said.

Despite the contentiousness, some demonstrators are obviously enjoying themselves. "FReepers continue to frustrate the Pinkos' evil scheme," a FreeRepublic fan wrote in an August blog post describing the group's 18th "fabulous fun" standoff against the war protesters. And the fan noted: "We ate pizza on site."

How long will the Friday night fights go on? "As long as it takes," Murphy said.

"Until Code Pink stops protesting outside the hospital," Taylor said.

It was billed as an opportunity to hear from the troops. But a hearing of the House Armed Services Committee in Washington Nov. 3 became more of a morale-boosting session led by Rep. Duncan Hunter, R-Calif., committee chairman.

A "Full Committee hearing on Your Troops — Their Stories," as it was advertised, did not feature any real "troops," per se. No Sergeant Snuffys or Lance Corporal Beltbuckles just back from war to tell the folks on Capitol Hill what's really going on.

Instead, Hunter invited a gung-ho Army command sergeant major, an Army colonel — son of Gen. Creighton Abrams of Abrams tank fame — and a Marine one-star general who works on Capitol Hill as a legislative aide to the Marine Corps commandant.

Despite their past contributions to the war effort, none of the three had been in Iraq more recently than early 2005, and the Marine general had not deployed there since last year.

At a time when the American public is increasingly concerned about the war in Iraq and President Bush's own political problems are sinking his approval ratings, the hearing seemed to be an attempt to buoy everyone's spirits, **even though most of the 62 committee members didn't show up.**

General Calls Use Of 152nd Inexcusable: "'We're Flat Out Of Troops In The National Guard,' Libby Said"

Maj. Gen. John "Bill" Libby, freshly returned from visiting his Maine Army National Guard troops in Iraq, called it "inexcusable" that the 152nd Maintenance Company is being used primarily as a security force.

"Three years in . . . it's inexcusable to have brought a maintenance company over there to do anything but maintenance," Libby said. "It's particularly galling to me when I strip myself of full-time mechanics and they get there and they're in a tower."

Libby, speaking with reporters Thursday, said switching assignments on the unit hurts his ability to recruit and retain soldiers for the Guard.

"They were frustrated by not being able to be mechanics... and I'll have a tough time convincing them to re-enlist," he said. That creates problems in an area that is already a challenge for the National Guard and regular army.

The state's top military official spent three days in Iraq, where he held a town meetingstyle gathering with soldiers of the 152nd and traveled to southern and northern Iraq.

Libby's visit coincided with the announcement that the Maine Army National Guard's 240th Engineer Group will ship out in January for training in Indiana, and then be deployed to oversee engineer units in Afghanistan. Those 80 soldiers will be arriving there in February or March, roughly the same time the 150 members of the 152nd are scheduled to return home from Iraq, Libby said.

With the latest deployment, about 80 percent of the Maine National Guard will have been deployed during the current conflict. Those soldiers cannot be made to return under current rules that limit to 24 months guardsmen's active-duty obligation, he said.

"The Maine National Guard is just about out of the fight, as the overall National Guard is," he said. That poses a problem for the long-term presence of the Army in Iraq, he said. The National Guard and Reserve make up almost half of the 133,000 troops now in the country.

"Two years from now, where is that 133,000 going to come from? We're flat out of troops in the National Guard," Libby said.

When Libby arrived, a transport plane was preparing to leave with the body of a California National Guard battalion commander. While in Iraq, Libby saw a man who had to have both legs amputated.

RHS Grad Injured

RAYMOND - A local soldier is down, but not out.

Sgt. 1st Class Keith Gamble Jr., 32, a Class of 1991 Raymond High School graduate, was critically injured while serving in Iraq when the Humvee he was riding in triggered a roadside bomb that killed one man.

Gamble is being treated for third-degree burns covering 30 percent of his body, two shattered legs and shrapnel wounds to the back at Brook Medical Center, in Texas. His brother, Chris, said his brother was a gunner, meaning his upper body was outside the top of the vehicle when the bomb struck.

"The bomb blew up and flipped the Humvee over," he said. "And since he was on top, he was stuck inside and was on fire."

The incident occurred Oct. 15. The driver of the Humvee died and the two other people Keith was traveling with received minor injuries.

It was Keith's fourth tour of duty in Iraq, spanning back to the Gulf War in the early-'90s. He entered the Army after graduating from Raymond High, where he was a soccer star and won the team's Most Valuable Player award.

Injured Guard Soldier Returning Home

GRAND FORKS, N.D. - A North Dakota National Guard soldier who suffered a hand wound in Iraq was on his way home Thursday.

Spc. Andrew Frelich, 21, of Devils Lake, was to fly into Grand Forks on an 11 p.m. flight, the Guard said.

Frelich was serving with the 188th Air Defense Artillery's F Battery when his left hand was injured Oct. 5 when a homemade bomb exploded, destroying the Humvee carrying him and other soldiers.

Frelich was flown to Germany and then to Fort Bliss, Texas, for treatment. He will return to Fort Bliss at the end of the month for more treatment, the Guard said.

Frelich is the first member of the 188th to return home. The rest are expected to be back with their families by Thanksgiving.

Two Iraqi policemen were killed in a drive-by shooting in Baghdad.

In the early afternoon five police from the Thunder Brigade -- one of the Interior Ministry's elite commando units -- were killed when a roadside bomb exploded near they convoy. Four commandos were wounded.

Brigade Commander Ali Abdullah al-Obeidi said the commandos were attacked as the truck convoy they were escorting to Baghdad from the northern city of Kirkuk passed the town of Taza, some 230 kilometers (143 miles) north of the capital.

Two members of the Iraq government's Wolf Brigades were killed in a gun battle in Dura, south of Baghdad.

I wrote to my senators asking for their help. I received no response. I refused to be powerless. I began thinking that Mothers had to win our country back and was planning to organize a Mother's March on Washington.

I found the web site, www.truthout.org. Here I found Camp Casey, Military Families Speak Out, Veterans for Peace, Iraqi Vets Against the War etc. I had never heard of any of these people. I found that there already was a huge march planned for September 24th. WOW! GREAT! I didn't have to take on the huge task of planning a march. Phew! I just had to go!

And this tells me there is a larger movement ... that is in our bones and is beginning to surface.

Green Zone Wide Open To Resistance Attacks: Brawling, Non-English Speaking Mercenaries Taking Over

BAGHDAD -- Iraqi officials say security inside Baghdad's heavily fortified green zone could be compromised by the turnover this week of broad security duties from a British-run to an American-run private company.

"I am telling the State Department that we are really worried at this switch-over, which could not have been happening at a more sensitive moment in Iraq's political and security situation," said Bashar al-Naher, an adviser to Prime Minister Ibrahim al-Jaafari and his Islamic Dawa Party.

British-based Global Strategies Group lost the contract for the job in an open bidding process and handed over responsibility on Tuesday to Triple Canopy Inc., a Virginia-based company formed after the 2003 Iraq war by Delta Force veterans.

Several security operatives said they are worried about the wholesale change in personnel at a time when insurgents and terrorists are expected to step up attacks before parliamentary elections on Dec. 15.

"It takes a great deal of time for a guard to come across a whole gamut of different scenarios and to have stood at all sorts of different posts," said one Western security adviser, who declined to be named because of a desire to do business with the U.S. government in future.

"The sad fact is that when a formation changes, that is the most vulnerable time for that location ... as happened for a few weeks in Baghdad" after the 1st U.S. Cavalry took charge in the city from the Marines in 2003.

Another concern is that Triple Canopy employees have been recruited mainly in Latin America and speak little English. Global Strategies relies heavily on Britishtrained Nepalese Gurkhas and Sri Lankans, a majority of whom speak at least some English and often speak it well.

"A delay in communicating a problem because the guard cannot speak English down his walkie-talkie can have fatal consequences," said a security specialist familiar with procedures in Baghdad.

Yet another worry is over internal discipline. Fights already have broken out between Peruvian and Chilean guards, according to an American businessman living inside the green zone. "Apparently they had some scores to settle from past conflicts in that continent," he said.

Mr. al-Naher proposed that Triple Canopy beef up its forces by hiring several hundred of the outgoing guards until after Dec. 15, but there was no evidence that is being done.

However, green zone regulars said the new company's guards will be hard-pressed to match the work of Global Strategies' guards, who were known for their diligence in body-searching even senior officials and government ministers.

Maggie O'Kane recently leveled a blast in the Guardian at Iraqi coverage. Claiming she "lost nerve" in Afghanistan in 2002 after three of her colleagues were pulled from a car and, "in roughly the same amount of time as it takes to boil a kettle," executed by the Taliban, she then commented on present-day Iraq:

"The hacks are corralled in a single hotel where huge egos bang off the wall and each other. After a week or two, the atmosphere becomes suffocating... Since Al-Zarqawi's people started cutting off heads it is too dangerous for foreigners to go out.

"So, instead, his poor Iraqi fixer is off to some hell hole to count the bodies and get the pictures... "And that is the great tragedy for war reporting now. We no longer know what is going on but we are pretending we do. Any decent reporter knows that reporting from Baghdad now does a disservice to the truth.

"Increasingly, the fixers and translators have morphed into journalists -- and brave ones at that -- while services like Knight Ridder (whose coverage of Iraq has been outstanding) and Reuters have been hiring Iraqi reporters. Some of these reporters have then found themselves in American jails for covering the Iraqi insurgents; and almost 40 of them have died (without much note in our press) reporting the occupation and the insurgency -- as well as one, Yasser Salihee, evidently killed by an American sniper while driving to get gas on his day off in the low-level war zone that is much of Iraq.

It remains an amazing fact that an American occupation which began largely without Arabic-speakers -- it was going to be too easy to stock up on people who actually spoke the language -- has since been covered in our press mainly by reporters who can't communicate directly with the people they're covering (unless, of course, they happen to speak English).

As a result, the war (and the Iraq) we see in our newspapers, and especially on our television sets, is a distinctly constricted one, often hardly wider than the nearest giant American military base or Baghdad's well-fortified Green Zone.

Perhaps reporters, bearded or not, slipping by as anonymously as possible or in heavily armed security convoys, embedded with American or even Iraqi troops, can make it to spots around Baghdad, or, on rare occasions, elsewhere in the country (as part of military operations), but even for the bravest Western journalists, this has to be a desperately limiting situation.

Not surprisingly, whole areas of Iraq remain beyond our view much, if not all, of the time.

While Troops Die And Bush Buddies Loot The Treasury: Hunger In America Rises By 43% Over Last Five Years!

Hunger in American households has risen by 43 percent over the last five years, according to an analysis of US Department of Agriculture (USDA) data released today. The analysis, completed by the Center on Hunger and Poverty at Brandeis University, shows that more than 7 million people have joined the ranks of the hungry since 1999.

The USDA report, Household Food Security in the United States, 2004, says that 38.2 million Americans live in households that suffer directly from hunger and food insecurity, including nearly 14 million children. That figure is up from 31 million Americans in 1999.

"This is an unexpected and even stunning outcome," noted center director Dr. J. Larry Brown, a leading scholarly authority on domestic hunger. "This chronic level of hunger so long after the recession ended means that it is a man-made problem.

Congress and the White House urgently need to address growing income inequality and the weakening of the safety net in order to get this epidemic under control." [The silly man thinks they give a shit. What world does he live in?]

According to the Center on Hunger and Poverty, food insecurity increased by nearly a million households from 2003 to 2004. Rates of hunger increased in almost every single category of household during the same time, with single mothers and those living in or near poverty continuing to suffer from severely high rates of both food insecurity and hunger.

California, Texas, Arkansas, Missouri, North Carolina, New Mexico, Oklahoma and South Carolina all have food insecurity and hunger rates that are significantly higher than the national average. The lone bright spot in the nation is Oregon. Once considered to have the worst hunger in the country, Oregon has shown significant decreases in food insecurity and hunger since 1999-2001.

"With this astonishing level of food deprivation in America," Brown concluded, "we need President Bush to step up to the plate. If he now asks Congress to cut federal food programs, hunger will increase even further. We need the moral leadership to stem this crisis." [He just doesn't get it.
