

# British Military Command Negotiates A Truce With Afghan Resistance

BRITISH troops battling the Taliban are to withdraw from one of the most dangerous areas of Afghanistan after agreeing a secret deal with the local people.

Over the past two months British soldiers have come under sustained attack defending a remote mud-walled government outpost in the town of Musa Qala in southern Afghanistan. Eight have been killed there.

It has now been agreed the troops will quietly pull out of Musa Qala in return for the Taliban doing the same. The compound is one of four district government offices in the Helmand province that are being guarded by British troops.

Although soldiers on the ground may welcome the agreement, it is likely to raise new questions about troop deployment. Last month Sir Richard Dannatt, the new head of the British Army, warned that soldiers in Afghanistan were fighting at the limit of their capacity and could only "just" cope with the demands.

When British troops were first sent to Afghanistan it was hoped they would help kickstart the country's reconstruction. But under pressure from President Hamid Karzai they were forced to defend Afghan government "district centres" at Musa Qala, Sangin, Nowzad and Kajaki.

The move, opposed by Lieutenant-General David Richards, the Nato commander in Afghanistan, turned the four remote British bases into what Richards called "magnets" for the Taliban. All 16 of the British soldiers killed in action in southern Afghanistan have died at Musa Qala, Sangin or Nowzad.

The soldiers risk sniper fire and full-scale assaults from experienced Taliban fighters who can then blend into the local population after each attack.

The peace deal in Musa Qala was first mooted by representatives of the town's 2,000-strong population. About 400 people living in the immediate area of the district centre compound have been forced to evacuate their homes, most of which have been destroyed in the fighting.

Brigadier Ed Butler, the commander of the British taskforce, flew into Musa Qala 18 days ago, guarded only by his military police close-protection team, to attend a shura, or council of town elders, to negotiate a withdrawal.

Butler was taken in a convoy to the shura in the desert southeast of Musa Qala where the carefully formulated proposals were made. The British commander said that he was prepared to back a "cessation of fighting" if they could guarantee that the Taliban would also leave.

The deal, and the avoidance of the word ceasefire, allows both sides to disengage without losing face, an important aspect in the Afghan [translation: British ruling class] psyche.

There is frustration among many British troops that they have been unable to help on reconstruction projects because they have been involved in intense fighting. An e-mail from one officer published this weekend said: "We are not having an effect on the average Afghan.

"At the moment we are no better than the Taliban in their eyes, as all they can see is us moving into an area, blowing things up and leaving, which is very sad."

The Ministry of Defence announced this weekend that 10 British soldiers had been seriously injured in fighting in the last few days of August, bringing the total number of troops seriously injured in the country this year to 23.

A total of 29 British servicemen have lost their lives in southern Afghanistan in the past two months, including 14 who died when their Nimrod reconnaissance aircraft crashed on September 2.

A new poll published last week revealed a lack of public confidence over the deployment of troops in Afghanistan. According to the BBC poll, 53% of people opposed the use of British troops in the region.

## Jennings Soldier Killed In Iraq

A young soldier from Louisiana was killed by a roadside bomb last week in Baghdad, the U.S. Department of Defense confirmed Friday.

Cpl. Marcus A. Cain, 20, of Jennings, was assigned to the 4th Support Battalion, 1st Brigade, 4th Infantry Division at Fort Hood, Texas and had recently re-enlisted. According to a DOD news release, Cain died Sept. 14 "after a vehicle-borne improvised explosive device detonated in the vicinity of a West Baghdad Substation where they were located."

His funeral was scheduled Tuesday at 10 a.m. at Our Lady of Perpetual Help Church in Jennings.

A procession in and around the city to the church was scheduled Monday before a planned memorial service at 6:30 p.m., officials with Raphael Funeral Home said. The public is encouraged to line the procession route to pay last respects to Cain, who enlisted shortly after graduating from Jennings High School.

In an interview with KATC-TV in Lafayette, Cain's mother, Bennye Cain, remembered her last conversation with her son, the youngest of her four children.

"He was happy, you know, he was really happy," she said. "He had big plans."

Cain described her son, who was scheduled to leave Iraq in November, as "a kind funloving fellow, he didn't have any kids. He lived a young youthful life — that was him. He was just a youthful person. Everybody loved him."

Bennye Cain said one of the last things they spoke about were just how much he had learned while away.

"He said, 'I thought about things, mama — everything you tried to teach me was right.' He said, 'You used to tell me this and tell me that and I'd say because the way the world is how you didn't know what you were talking about. But I found out experience is the best teacher,'" she said.

## Marine Rejoins, Is Killed In Iraq; Son Loved Cars, People, Dad Says

Chris Zimmerman grew up loving cars and people. Cars he made faster. People he made happier.

Joining the Marine Corps after high school, the gifted artist and natural mechanic fixed helicopters and nurtured friendships.

Zimmerman left the Marines after five years, joined the Marine Reserves and thought about college. But nothing else fit.

After terrorists attacked the United States on Sept. 11, 2001, Zimmerman rejoined the Marines. He served in Afghanistan and then in Iraq.

"When he decided to go into the military, I said, 'Why are you going into the Marines?' " recalled his father, Mike Zimmerman of Stephenville, Texas. "He said, 'Because they're the best.' "

Sgt. Christopher M. Zimmerman on Wednesday gave his last to the best. He was killed in a midday gunbattle near Fallujah, his father said. He was 28.

The U.S. Department of Defense said Zimmerman was a member of a reconnaissance unit based at Camp Lejeune near Jacksonville.

Sgt. Zimmerman didn't talk much about the Iraq war or his role in it, said his father, a police officer at Tarleton State University in Stephenville.

"He said that they were accomplishing their mission quite well," the elder Zimmerman said in a phone interview Thursday night.

Growing up near Round Rock, Texas, Chris Zimmerman tinkered with cars.

"He worked on 'em, tried to make 'em faster or sound better or whatever he could do to, in his mind, improve 'em," his dad said.

And Zimmerman was always eager to lend friends a hand.

When Zimmerman left the Marines after his first stint, his superior officers spoke highly of him, his father said. But what really impressed Mike Zimmerman was what those who had worked under his son thought of him.

"I'm pretty much like anybody else who's lost a son or daughter. I don't think it matters how they die."

## Iraq Bomb Seriously Injures Two British Soldiers

A roadside bomb has seriously injured two British soldiers when their supply convoy was attacked in southern Iraq, military spokesman Major Charlie Burbridge said.

"A logistics convoy was conducting a routine resupply task when a roadside bomb was detonated. The soldiers concerned were evacuated by helicopter. Both are assessed to be seriously injured," he told AFP Sunday.

The booby trap severely damaged the troops' unarmoured truck as is passed along a major highway in Meysan province near the restive southeastern town of Amara, a hotbed of Shiite militia groups.

Burbridge said it was not yet known which group planted the bomb, and added: "We have to accept that there are armed groups operating in Meysan who still think they can attack multinational forces." [Huh? "Think" they can attack the British occupiers? Isn't that what they just did? Another idiot in command.]

"Where's Flat Daddy?" an excited Baylee asked as her stepmother, Jennifer Smith, pulled a large cardboard picture of Sergeant Smith, in his uniform, out of her Chevy Blazer and propped him on the bumper. The two, along with Ms. Smith's young sons, Alec and Derek, posed for a picture with their Flat Daddy, who promptly fell down.

"Stop it Dad, that's not funny. It's not a joke," Baylee said with a laugh.

The Maine National Guard is giving life-size from-the-waist-up pictures of soldiers to the families of deployed guard members. Guard officials and families say the cutouts, known as Flat Daddies or Flat Soldiers, connect families with a relative who is thousands of miles away. The Flat Daddies are toted everywhere from soccer practice to coffee shops to weddings.



Police found the body of a policeman a day after he was captured in the town of al-Shirgat, 80 km (50 miles) south of Mosul, local authorities said.



I've never understood the idea of speaking truth to power. The truth, surely, is that in almost all countries of the world, political and economic systems are designed to benefit only the rich and powerful, at the expense of those with less money and power.

This is how the world works, and I see no reason to think that the powerful don't already understand that. After all, they designed it; they maintain it.

They steal our money, sacrifice our children in their wars, send the poorest and most victimized among us off to jail for petty mistakes, and crush those of us who might present a real threat to the arrangement.

They know we don't like it. They don't care. They don't need to care.

Meanwhile, we get angry and toddle off to tell the truth to the powerful. We have been telling them the truth for centuries. We travel to their great palaces by the hundreds of thousands, to express our anger and despair. We shout and sing and stomp and whine. We threaten. We plead.

Sometimes we're beaten up, or sent to jail. It's a tradition of great courage and personal sacrifice, no doubt.

We go to tell them to stop using our money and our children and our energy and intelligence to further rob and rape and murder us. We tell them to be more respectful and compassionate.

We're like angry but terrorized children, anxiously scolding our stern, all-powerful parents.

And, in the end, we look to the Democrats or to some congressional panel or to the Supreme Court and demand that they come to our aid.

As my friend Harry puts it: "We're left in the terrible position of trying to decide which elite group will be less likely to prey on us."

Well, the government and their pals are not going to stop using and abusing us.

They're not going to stop preying on us.

They cannot stop!

Republican or Democrat, they are rich and powerful precisely because they prey on us. They are rich because they rob us. They're robbing us right this minute.

They are powerful because they dominate every aspect of our lives, because they've taken control of all the major social, political, economic, and communication systems in the world. These systems were designed to increase their wealth and power by taking both from all the rest of us.

But, we are not children, and they are not our parents. We're not little people and they are not big people. We're not insignificant and they are not significant. In fact, we do not need them.

They are very few and we, here in the US alone, are roughly 300 million.

We don't need to rush out to tell the few that they are abusing the many.

They already know that.

We need to look to our next door neighbors, and to their next door neighbors and to the folks all along the block.

We need to tell the truth to each other -- for we are the answer

Most Americans live in my neighborhood, or in your neighborhood. Most Americans eat breakfast right next to you in the local cafe. Most Americans get their car fixed at the same garage as you and I do. Most Americans visit my library, my bookstore, my grocery store, my local park -- or yours.

But the rich and powerful have convinced us that we cannot -- we must not -- communicate with the people we can see and hear and touch, right here, right now.

They have convinced us that we need to travel to some government office to persuade elected officials and bureaucrats to change our world for us.

The government and media drone on, endlessly, hypnotically, and convince us that if we just elect the right leaders, they'll talk to our next door neighbor for us.

The elites are too busy dividing us, setting us against each other, exacerbating every animosity, every misgiving, every anxiety, however slight.

"There oughta be a law," says the old complaint. Well, there will be, to be sure -- but it will just make things worse.

We're all looking in the wrong place for reason and compassion and justice. It's not anywhere to be found in Washington, DC. It's not in governments or state houses. It's not there in that prestigious gathering of experts and big brains.

It's right here. It's wherever you are, and it's right next door and it's everywhere along your street and all around your neighborhood.

It's in the cars that pass you on the roadways and in the shops where you buy your dog or cat food.

There's no need to travel a thousand or even a hundred miles. It's not necessary to make the climb up to the penthouse. Our hope, our possibility -- our only hope, our only possibility, lies in the ordinary people who compose our world, who are the very stuff of our lives.

Want to change the world? Tell the truth to the plumber. Begin with the lady who hands you the stamps at the post office. Talk with the checkout people at the grocery store. Chat with the waiter at your favorite cafe.

Gab for a few minutes with the guy who changes your oil or with the elementary school teacher with whom you've been discussing your child's future. Lean out of your window while stopped at the light and tell the truck driver some truth he's certain to recall and ponder.

Blab and babble and blunder and tell the truth, one ordinary person at a time. We're all ordinary people, and we are our only hope. Tell the truth to the guy who pumps out the septic tank – he's one of us! Forget about telling the government, forget about the hot shots.

To the extent that we believe we need them, exactly to that extent will we continue our dependence upon ruthless, murderous plunderers, people entirely opposed to our needs and deepest longings.

The depth of our apparent need is the measure of their height above us. The nightmare of our poverty is our dream that they have a right to take our money. The illusion of our impotence is the chimera of their monstrous strength. We shall be slaves as long as we're convinced that we have masters, and not one moment longer.

Time to wake up, time to grow up. We're not children. We do not need to ask permission to live like sane, reasonable, thoughtful, compassionate human beings. We do not need to beg or bow or kneel.

We do not need to look to government or to experts or to the rich and famous. Whatever we need, we can get it ourselves. Whatever we want to stop, we can stop it ourselves.

Whatever must be done, we can do it ourselves.

We do not need them; we need each other.

All else is distraction and delusion.

One day while I was in a bunker in Vietnam, a sniper round went over my head. The person who fired that weapon was not a terrorist, a rebel, an extremist, or a so-called insurgent. The Vietnamese individual who tried to kill me was a citizen of Vietnam, who did not want me in his country. This truth escapes millions.

## **Bullshit Detection**

There are endless thousands of words circulating daily.

To save time, watch for these tip-offs that what follows isn't worth your time and effort.

The words and expressions below find a home in the chattering class, where they serve as recognition signals that the individual using them is a fellow member of that very elite, very exclusive club: the self-promoting, self-adoring wing of the intelligentsia.

For the "I'm the center of the universe" crowd, they are the equivalent of gang signs.

They are most often used by people who see words as unconnected to action and who therefore find no virtue in directness or economy of written production.

In the academic circles in which most of the chatterers move, it is a law of life that nothing is to be said in one page when it can be expanded to three, and no one or two syllable word is to survive that can be replaced by a longer, vaguer word.

Here they are, just for you:

"Narrative" As in, "The Zionist narrative about the intervention of the Israeli government in Lebanon......"

Stop reading. The rest is bullshit. Zionists **lie** about the intervention of the Israeli government in Lebanon..." They do not stand about "narrating."

"Narrative" is used to say "Look at me me me. I use words like this to show who I am."

Words like this may also be used to show the user is calm, thoughtful, reflective, superior in intellect, and definitely not someone who would be so crude as to say that the Israeli government is made up of a pack of racist terrorist rats.

Oh no, they would never use language like that! Instead, they talk about an Israeli "narrative," as if mass murderers are reading story books to children.

**"Nuanced"** Gives away the rest is bullshit. People who use this word have no interest in being clear and direct. Fuck 'em.

The U.S. military said a captured al-Qaida suspect and members of his cell were "in the final stages" of planning an attack on the Green Zone. An unprecedented curfew prompted by the arrest left millions of Baghdadis stranded at home on Saturday without supplies during the Islamic holy month of Ramadan.

The U.S. military said the suspected al-Qaida in Iraq member was arrested late Friday at the home of senior Sunni Arab political leader Adnan al-Dulaimi, where he was working as a personal bodyguard.

Al-Dulaimi is a member of the Iraqi Accordance Front, the largest Sunni coalition in the 275-member parliament, where it holds 44 seats, and the military was quick to distance the politician from the raid, stressing that he was "not the target."

As a bodyguard for al-Dulaimi, Farhan could have had access to the parliament, often attended by the prime minister and his staff, and possibly to offices used by Cabinet members.

Farhan also was suspected of having links to a car bomb network operating in the southern area of Baghdad, the military said.

The U.S. command said al-Dulaimi "did meet the force and offered his home to be searched, which was declined as the operation had no association with him. They only searched the security trailer and the suspect's vehicle." ## Legal Experts Question Selection Of Kangaroo As Saddam's New Judge

Two weeks after the judge in Saddam Hussein's trial for crimes against humanity was dismissed for displaying leniency towards the former Iraqi dictator, the proceedings became embroiled in controversy once again as legal experts questioned the selection of a kangaroo as the judge's replacement.

While the dismissal of the previous judge, Abdullah al-Amiri, raised eyebrows in legal circles because it suggested to some that the Iraqi government was trying to

predetermine the results of the trial, the selection of a kangaroo from the Sydney Zoo in Australia did little to allay those concerns.

"The new Iraqi government is already facing an uphill struggle to gain any kind of credibility for the trial of Saddam Hussein," said Hassan El-Medfaai, president of the Iraqi Bar Association. "It is hard to see how putting a kangaroo in charge helps achieve that goal."

The kangaroo, who was known as Annette during her tenure at the Sydney Zoo, received mixed reviews on her first day in the Baghdad courtroom where Mr. Hussein is being tried.

After one of the former dictator's trademark outbursts, the kangaroo appeared alarmed, jumped from the bench, and had to be subdued with a tranquilizer dart before the proceedings could continue.

At the White House, President Bush praised Saddam's new judge and said that he would consider appointing a kangaroo to the U.S. Supreme Court, so long as the kangaroo agreed with him on abortion and prayer in schools.

Elsewhere, a team of French doctors made history by performing surgery in zero gravity on an airplane, but were then arrested for bringing liquids and sharp objects onboard.

# Report: Iranian Science Teachers May Be Enriching Students

WASHINGTON, DC: A recently released Pentagon report is raising new worries that Iran has been operating several large facilities designed solely for the purpose of enriching mass quantities of high-grade students.

"We have reason to believe that specially trained Iranian science teachers are taking raw, unrefined brain power and bombarding it with knowledge at accelerated levels," said U.S. Undersecretary Of Defense For Intelligence Stephen Cambone at a Tuesday press conference. "If current levels of student concentration remain this high, Iran could be a mere five to eight years away from developing an atomic scientist."

Leading analysts believe that the teachers are using a widely applied enrichment process in which students are isolated from such elements as family, play, and cartoons, and are rotated through seven separative work units over the course of each day. This

cycle is repeated for months, until the students are made highly reactive to reading matter, which enables them to absorb large amounts of information in short periods of time.

The students are then continually exposed to heavy material, taught to achieve critical thought, and finally graduate to a state of explosive productivity.

Hard evidence that would support the Pentagon's findings includes a top-secret syllabus, acquired by the CIA, which indicates that Iran may begin testing their students, possibly without warning, as early as next Friday. Reconnaissance-satellite images also reveal the presence of two Tehran–area facilities identified by intelligence sources only as "P.S. 235" and "H.S. 238."

Despite the Pentagon's announcement in mid-June that Iran had halted its nuclear-science program, additional satellite photos taken in early September clearly show 40-foot-long buses transporting multiple loads of students to these facilities in the morning hours between 7 and 8 a.m. Some images also reveal a short, 20-foot-long bus thought to contain a smaller number of highly volatile, non-reactive, and extremely dense students.

"While we believe that a majority of these students were developed within Iran's borders anywhere from 13 to 17 years ago, there is also evidence that they are importing older students from former Soviet republics and Pakistan in what officials have dubbed an 'exchange program,'" CIA Director Michael Hayden said.

Although no one is sure exactly what is being conducted inside the accelerated core curriculum, a team of UNESCO inspectors who visited suspected Iranian enrichment facilities in 2004 found a number of microscopes, Bunsen burners, centrifuges, and reference materials, including a stockpile of instructional materials and textbooks covered in brown paper wrapping intended to obscure the material's subject matter.

In a nationally televised Oval Office address Tuesday, President Bush expressed the concern that if Iran is allowed to enrich its students unchecked, many of them could end up anywhere, with some potentially landing in major university centers in New York and Los Angeles.

"The U.S. stopped enriching its students decades ago, and we call upon Iran to do the same," Bush said. "If the Iranians do not put an end to this program by the middle of December, and impose final examinations, they could face further isolation from the international community."

As the U.S. awaits a response to the ultimatum, American intelligence continues to monitor a rumored late-afternoon summit, consisting of a series of secretive bilateral meetings between parents and a female science expert known as Mrs. Bakhtiari.

# The Super-Rich Get Richer: Forbes 400 Are All Billionaires; Income? \$1 Million An Hour

It's not news that Bill Gates is the richest person in America, according to Forbes magazine's annual list of the nation's 400 richest people, released yesterday. He has been for 13 years. Barring a second Stone Age in which computers are good only for hurling at other cavemen, Gates will always be rich.

The news is: On this list, \$999 million is chump change.

For the first time, all 400 Gotbucks on the Forbes tally are billionaires, from Gates (worth \$53 billion) down to the bottom, Los Angeles semiconductor magnate Sehat Sutardja (\$1 billion).

It's not just the accumulated wealth that draws attention to the list; it's the eyepopping numbers that show the speed with which wealth is gained and lost at the dawn of this millennium. For instance, according to Forbes:

Casino mogul Sheldon Adelson (No. 3, \$20.5 billion) has made \$1 million per hour over the past two years.

Google Inc. founders Sergey Brin (No. 12, \$14.1 billion) and Larry Page (No. 13, \$14 billion) have each made \$13 million per day over the past two years.

Forbes has been publishing the much-ballyhooed list -- which relies on research and estimates and rounds net worth to the nearest \$100 million -- since 1982.

The inaugural list contained only 13 billionaires.

Even after the technology crash at the beginning of the century, a three-year war and a jumpy economy, the wealth accumulation among the richest Americans continues unabated and has risen to historic proportions, even if measured by an arbitrarily arrived-at number (400, the number of swells who could fit into the Victorian New York ballroom of Caroline Astor).

"I think it's very bad," said Dean Baker, a macroeconomist at the Center for Economic and Policy Research in Washington.

"If the U.S. had experienced really extraordinary growth, then maybe that would be the reason" for all the billionaires. Baker pointed out that U.S. economic growth in the past 25 years -- the period that hatched this crop of billionaires -- is actually slower than in the preceding quarter-century, which produced only 13 billionaires.

"If these people pull away so much wealth," he said, "that means everyone else has less."

The growth in the number of billionaires has been significantly aided by cuts in U.S. tax rates that allow the wealthy to keep more of their money, said Harvard University economics professor Larry Katz.

Today's marginal tax rate for the richest Americans is 35 percent, down from more than 60 percent 25 years ago.

One-third of the Forbes 400 is concentrated in two places: California, which has 89 billionaires, and New York City, with 44.

The billionaire-free states are West Virginia, Vermont, Alaska, Maine, Delaware, Mississippi, Iowa, New Mexico, Kentucky and North Dakota. (South Dakota has one.) Even Wyoming, the least populous state, has a billionaire -- Christy Walton (No. 7, \$15.6 billion), one of eight Wal-Mart family members on the list, four of whom are in the top 10.

# While Billionaires Grab It All, Very Old And Very Young Dying For Lack Of Health Care

WASHINGTON - The nation's youngest and oldest citizens are suffering the most from a fragmented, wasteful and in some cases dangerous health care system, according to a new study.

When compared to nearly two dozen other industrialized countries, the U.S. has the highest infant mortality rate and the lowest life expectancy for people who have reached the age of 60.

Nearly one in four U.S. adults reported having to wait at least six days to receive care when they needed medical attention.

Hispanics are far more likely to lack health insurance than other ethnic and racial groups.

The mortality rate among black Americans is significantly higher at infancy and for those with heart disease or diabetes. Blacks also have considerably lower rates of cancer survival.
