

## **IRAQ WAR REPORTS**

### **U.S. Soldier Wounded By Baghdad IED; Green Zone Mortared**

April 28 (Reuters) & April 30 (Reuters)

One U.S. soldier was wounded by a roadside bomb in Baghdad's northern Adhamiya district on Thursday night, the U.S. military said.

Two mortar rounds landed in the heavily fortified Green Zone government and diplomatic neighbourhood of Baghdad, without causing any casualties, the office of the Baghdad security command said.

A rocket fired from an unknown location hit a government building in the centre of Kabul city on Tuesday, the Interior Ministry said. The explosion broke some windows panes of the building housing the Ministry of Town and Urban Development, but caused no casualties, it added.

Two roadside bombs struck a convoy of Afghan police in Kandahar yesterday, killing two pedestrians and wounding another.

Two policemen were killed when two suspected car bombers attacked police checkpoints in southern Baghdad, police said.

A bomb on a pickup truck attached to the Electricity Ministry wounded two ministry employees and two bystanders in the Mansour district of western Baghdad, an Interior Ministry source said.

A parked car bomb killed three policemen and wounded two policemen in Baghdad's northern Qahira district, police said.

A roadside bomb killed a policeman on Friday in western Mosul.

KABUL—U.S. soldiers shot and killed the relative of a lawmaker during a nighttime raid in eastern Afghanistan, setting off protests by angry villagers who chanted “Death to America!”

**Safia Sidiqi, a member of the Afghan parliament representing Surkh Rod, told AFP that the troops entered her home without any warning.**

The raid and ensuing demonstration were a sharp reminder of how much trouble North Atlantic Treaty Organization forces have had in avoiding civilian casualties, and the deep resentment those deaths have engendered among Afghans.

On Wednesday night, U.S. soldiers searched a village compound near the city of Jalalabad, said Afghan and U.S. military officials.

NATO's Afghanistan task force said in a statement that foreign and Afghan troops were pursuing a "Taliban facilitator," and spotted an armed man near one of the houses in the compound and ordered him to put down his weapon. "The individual ignored the repeated commands, raised his weapon and aimed at the combined force, and then was shot and killed," NATO said.

**"I didn't see any Afghan forces," said Shah Fasiyal Sidiqi, the younger brother of Afghan member of Parliament Safiya Sidiqi and one of those whom U.S. forces held for several hours during the raid.**

**The dead man turned out to be the brother-in-law of Safya Sidiqi, a member of the Afghan parliament.**

It was his family's compound that was raided, Ms. Sidiqi said, calling his death "barbaric and unjustifiable."

**Ms. Sidiqi, who wasn't at the compound during the raid, said her brother-in-law grabbed his gun — a common household item throughout Afghanistan—because he thought bandits were trying to rob his home.**

**"My brothers thought they were thieves," Sidiqi told AFP.**

**"One of my relatives took a shotgun and walked out of the room. The troops shot him dead," she said. The victim had been visiting the family for the night, she said.**

The MP said the troops tied her brothers' hands despite her brothers identifying themselves in English as siblings of a lawmaker.

**She disputed NATO's account that he was warned by soldiers before being shot.**

Her brother, Shah Fasiyal Sidiqi, a resident of Canada who had returned to Afghanistan this week to visit his family, was there when the Americans came looking for a Taliban leader.

He said that more than 80 U.S. soldiers took over the family compound before midnight. The Americans tied up 15 men, women and children and blindfolded them, he said.

Ms. Sidiqi also said that during the raid, soldiers blindfolded the 15 people in the house, including women and children, and pulled them outside. The soldiers then sent in dogs to sniff through the house, she said in a telephone interview.

**"They disgraced our pride and our religion by letting their dogs sniff the holy Koran, our food and the kitchen," Ms. Siddiqi said.**

“I was afraid of Taliban, and now I can say the Americans are the enemy of the women of Afghanistan,” she said.

During the search, Safiya Sidiqi said, one of her brothers-in-law left a neighboring house with an old hunting rifle and was shot.

**Authorities in Nangarhar province, where the raid took place, said they were not told about the operation in advance.**

**“U.S. forces went to that village without keeping the Afghan security forces informed,” said Mr. Abdul Ghafor, a spokesman for the provincial police.**

**“When the Afghan security forces tried to talk to the U.S. forces they were prevented from entering the village by the U.S. soldiers.”**

Demonstrators took to the streets in Nangarhar province yesterday as Safiya Sidiqi denounced the United States for the raid that killed one of her relatives.

By Thursday, word of the raid had spread throughout the area, and hundreds of angry people poured onto the highway linking Jalalabad with Kabul to protest the killing.

The protesters chanted “Death to America!” and “Long Live Islam!” and blocked the road, a key supply route, for about four hours, officials said.

# Continued Ability To Re-Infiltrate Areas Cleared By U.S. Forces

A Pentagon report presented a sobering new assessment Wednesday of the Taliban-led insurgency in Afghanistan, saying that its abilities are expanding and its operations are increasing in sophistication, despite recent major offensives by US forces in the militants' heartland.

The report portrays an insurgency with deep roots and broad reach, able to withstand repeated US onslaughts and to reestablish its influence.

The Taliban are improving their ability to set up shadow governments that "discredit the authority and legitimacy" of the government of Afghan President Hamid Karzai, according to a Pentagon assessment of the war's progress.

The Taliban leadership over the past six months has been able to strengthen its command over regional subordinates, as part of an attempt to become a "legitimate alternative government."

In addition, the Pentagon found that the insurgent leaders have improved their ability to conduct complex attacks on U.S. and North Atlantic Treaty Organization troops and have ordered commanders to shift focus away from attacking allied troops head-on to using roadside bombs.

The report said the number of roadside bombs used by the Taliban has increased 236% over the past year.

The Pentagon found the Taliban still have "robust means" for sustaining operations by taxing the opium trade in Afghanistan and raising funds outside the country, delivered via couriers and hawalas, or Islamic money-exchange networks.

The report said the number of violent incidents was about double that of a year ago.

The report describes the Taliban's continued ability to re-infiltrate areas cleared by U.S. and allied forces and the inability of the U.S. and its Afghan allies to improve infrastructure at a rate that shows tangible benefits to the Afghan people.

### **Insurgent Fighters Gain Territory In Central Somalia**

At least 10 combatants were killed and over 20 others injured in heavy clashes that pitted insurgent group Al-Shabaab against pro-government Sufi militia group Ahlu Sunnah Wal Jama in central Somali villages, Radio Garowe reports.

Fighting erupted in the strategic central Somali village of El Bahay in located 80km north of Guriel town in Galgadud region where fighters from Al-Shabaab insurgents attacked the village, resulting the death of at least six combatants.

"We attacked and captured the area from our foes. It is part of our plans to expand our grip on territories in central regions," said an Al-Shabaab official.

Al-Shabaab fighters also carried out attacks on a military base used by government troops and pro-government Ahlu Sunnah in the north of Beledweyne, the capital of Hiran region.

“Today we attacked a training base used by government troops and their Ahlu Sunnah colleagues. We captured the base and some weapons,” said Yussuf Ali Ugas, Al-Shabaab commander in Hiran region.

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## **30 Somalis Worshipers Slaughtered As Bombs Blow Up Mosque Where Insurgent Leader Is Attending Services: [CIA? Mossad?] [Of Course Not. They Would Never Butcher Civilians Wholesale, Would They?]**

Two bombs exploded inside a mosque in Mogadishu's main market on Saturday in the first Iraq-style bombing inside a house of worship in Somalia. At least 30 people were killed and 70 wounded, officials said.

The blasts in the Bakara market went off while people were sitting inside the Abdala Shideye mosque waiting for noon prayers.

Most of the victims were worshippers, said businessman Ahmed Abdulle, a witness.

“The first one occurred at the back of the mosque and the other one at the front. I saw the dead bodies of at least 11 people and 18 injured,” said a businessman, Isma'il Dahir.

“The blood stained the walls and human flesh was scattered everywhere.”

Ali Muse, the head of Mogadishu's ambulance service, said at least 30 people were killed and 70 wounded. Abdullahi Haji Ilmi, a witness, said he counted 32 bodies.

**A high-ranking member of Somalia's most powerful insurgent militia, al-Shabab, was said to be inside the mosque during the explosions. It was not immediately known whether Fuad Mohamed Qalaf survived the bombings.**

“Sheikh Fuad used to teach religious lessons at the mosque every Saturday. He was there when the blasts went off. The whole area was cordoned off by scores of al-Shabab militants. Nobody could get inside,” said another businessman, Farhan Alin.

**An al-Shabab spokesman, Sheik Ali Mohamud Rage, blamed the attack on the work of “foreign security companies” whose aim, he said, was to massacre Muslims.**

**No-one immediately claimed responsibility for the attack, the first such bombing of a mosque in Somalia.**

Bakara market is the country’s main market, and despite tensions in the country, it is bustling with business.

**The area is controlled by the rebel groups al-Shabab and Hizbul Islam.**

The UN-backed Somali government views the market as rebel stronghold. Islamic insurgents control much of Mogadishu and have been trying to topple the fragile government for three years. Somalia has not had an effective government for nearly 20 years.

The U.S. presence ended in Vietnam as U.S. Marines and Air Force helicopters, flying from carriers off-shore, begin a massive airlift, Operation Frequent Wind. In all, 682 flights went out-- 360 at night. 5,000 people were evacuated by helicopter from the military compound near Saigon's Tan Son Nhut airport; about 2500 from the U.S. Embassy (1000 Americans total, the rest Vietnamese).

That morning, two U.S. Marines, Darwin Judge and Charles McMahon Jr., Marine security guards, were killed in a rocket attack at the airport. They were the last Americans to die in the Vietnam War. At dawn, the last Marines of the force guarding the U.S. embassy lifted off.

The war in Vietnam ended as the government in Saigon announced its unconditional surrender to the North Vietnamese. Vietnam was reunited after 21 years of U.S. domination and 100 years of French colonial rule.





CAIRO — Day after day, hundreds of workers from all over Egypt have staged demonstrations and sit-ins outside Parliament, turning sidewalks in the heart of the capital into makeshift camps and confounding government efforts to bring an end to the protests.

Nearly every day since February, protesters have chanted demands outside Parliament during daylight and laid out bedrolls along the pavement at night.

The government and its allies have been unable to silence the workers, who are angry about a range of issues, including low salaries.

Using an emergency law that allows arrest without charge and restricts the ability to organize, the Egyptian government and the ruling National Democratic Party have for decades blocked development of an effective opposition while monopolizing the levers of power.

The open question — one that analysts say the government fears — is whether the workers will connect their economic woes with virtual one-party rule and organize into a political force.

This week, with blankets stacked neatly behind them, at least four different groups were banging pots, pans and empty bottles and chanting slogans. There were factory workers, government workers, employees of a telephone company and handicapped men and women. The group of handicapped people said they had been there for 47 days, demanding jobs and housing.

"If we get our rights, we will leave," said Gamal Sharqawy, 42, a government worker who said that he and about 200 others had spent 22 days on the pavement. His demand was for a pay raise. He earns \$18 a month.

"We will take our rights," he said with a blend of despair and determination.

While political demonstrations are still dealt with harshly, the government's approach to labor protests has been to negotiate, offering raises and back pay to get workers off the street.

"The current wave of protests is erupting from the largest social movement Egypt has witnessed in more than half a century," wrote Joel Beinin, a professor of Middle East history at Stanford and principal author of a report on Egypt's labor movement for the Solidarity Center, a labor-financed advocacy group in Washington.

The report said that 1.7 million workers engaged in 1,900 "strikes and other forms of protest" from 2004 through 2008.

The government has tried to define workers' complaints as pocketbook issues, analysts said, hoping that if specific demands are met, workers will disband without blaming those in charge and without adding political change to their list of priorities.

For a time, that seemed to work.

"The government realizes the most important thing is to ensure these protests are kept at a wide distance from the political opposition elite, because then it will not gain momentum," said Hossam Bahgat, director of the Egyptian Initiative for Personal Rights.

As evidence, he said the leaders of the state security agencies had held negotiations between protesters and the government, often pressing ministries to meet workers' demands.

**"They think this is a way to contain protests, but what happened is the workers have come away empowered," Mr. Bahgat said.**

**Workers say they have learned that if they stage job actions in their factories, as they used to do, they will be dealt with harshly by the police. But if they make noise on the streets of Cairo, the government will relent.**

Surrounded by barricades and the police 24 hours a day, the demonstrators have turned the sidewalks into a revolving door of protests.

Nearly every work sector has appeared at one time, including tax collectors, who struck for three months. About the only group that has not is the security force.

This month, Hassan Nashaat al-Qasas, a member of Parliament and of the governing party, was quoted in the news media as calling on the Interior Ministry to shoot the protesters: "Instead of using water hoses to disperse them, the police ought to shoot them; they deserve it."

In a speech on Saturday, a national holiday, President Hosni Mubarak seemed to respond to the protesters. While insisting that the nation had come a long way economically, he acknowledged that there were still significant problems and poverty, a concession for a leader who has been in power for nearly 30 years.

**Then Mr. Mubarak appeared to signal he would not tolerate much more.**

"I sincerely welcome the interplay in the society as long as it abides by laws and the Constitution, and is intended to realize the interest of Egypt," he said. "This interaction should not turn into a conflict or a confrontation and we have to be aware of such a turn."

**But his words went unheeded on the streets outside Parliament.**

Near the chamber of the upper house of Parliament, where hundreds of people were gathered, employees from a yarn factory had set up a model coffin, saying it represented the Egyptian worker.

Khalid Jaraj, 40, a father of three small children, said he worked for a factory that had run out of cash and had not paid him his salary of \$110 a month for three months.

Amira Mahmoud, 25, jumped up from her place on the sidewalk to explain that, yes, she wanted to see the root of the workers' problems solved.

"We want a solution, and that is democracy," she said.

But, she added, what she needed first was some money to survive. "There is not enough money, not enough money for us to live," she said as a crowd assembled.

Over Ms. Mahmoud's shoulder, Fouad Whaba, 35, shouted: "We will die. We will die."
